Hazard Management Plan for an evening stand-up comedy show. HUMOROUS ARTS TRUST



Context: An evening ticketed line-up show run by Humorous Arts Trust (HAT) It is in a pub, theatre, casino, hotel, restaurant, nightclub or other publicly accessible venue, for the purposes of providing stand-up comedy to an audience. The venue supplies bar service, backstage area and seating. HAT provides the contracted entertainment. Provision of stage, lighting, sound and crew staff can vary depending on the venue and gig.

Be aware if there is an active shooter, police will come through armed and in full riot gear, their first priority will be to find and secure the shooter, they will shout directions, follow their directions.

Note that many people will choose to evaluate themselves, if people want to leave after an earthquake even if the building is secure let them leave.
